Chronological understanding						
Year 1	Place known events and objects in chronological order Sequence events and recount changes within living memory. Use common words and phrases relating to the passing of time

Historical enquiry

Year 4	Use sources of information in ways that go beyond simple observations to answer questions about the past Use a variety of resources to find out about aspects of the life in the past

Year 6	Address and sometimes devise historically valid questions about change, cause, similarity and difference, and significance. Construct informed responses that involve thoughtful selection and organisation of relevant historical information.					

Historical interpretations				
Year 1	Relate their own account of an event and understand that others may give a different version			
Year 2 Describe changes within living memory and aspects of change in national life Describe events beyond living memory that are significant nationally or globally e.g. the first aeroplane flight or events commemorated through festivals or anniversaries				

Year 3	Look at more than two versions of the same event or story in history and identify differences.					
Year 4	Investigate different accounts of historical events and be able to explain some of the reasons why the accounts may be different.					
Year 5	Make comparisons between aspects of periods of history and the present day Understand that the type of information available depends on the period of time studied Evaluate the usefulness of a variety of sources and their reliability.					
Year 6	Use a range of evidence to offer some clear reasons for different interpretations of events, linking this to factual understanding about the past. Show an awareness of the concept of propaganda.
